
Peace Officers Day

Village Business Financial Updates

As many of you know, the majority of our tax revenue is from income tax (i.e. payroll taxes). Growth and loss of business in our town directly affects our general fund budget and our capital budget. The mayor has been an advocate in building business relationships in our village, over the past four years I have had a chance to work directly with some of our business professionals to build financial relationships with them. Please see several business updates below that will impact our income taxes.

Specialized Construction

The village-based asphalt and paving company is the first business to benefit from an Arctaris Impact Investment Program in Cuyahoga County. The county and the new owner Brian Hall welcomed our administration at the official announcement on April 20, 2022. Specialized Construction will remain in Cuyahoga Heights and retain the 40 plus employees. This minority-led paving company plans to expand with an additional 15 employees over the next several years. We are excited to maintain a great relationship with Specialized Construction.

Charter Steel

Charter Steel is expanding again! We are working together on a new Enterprise Zone Agreement. This agreement will not only bring additional jobs to Cuyahoga Heights, but it will positively impact the school districts revenue stream. The village and school pride themselves on collaboration to maintain a great community and school district.

From the desk of Chief Sturgill

Dear Residents and Valued Business Partners:

It seems that we have finally reached the end of another Northeast Ohio winter. With the warmer weather and longer days comes an increase in pedestrian and bicycle traffic (especially children) on the sidewalks and streets. We ask that you please pay increased attention and be more cautious while entering and exiting of driveways and while driving through our residential areas.

While on the subject of bicycling...

We all can agree that while riding a bicycle is fun, healthy, and a great way to be independent, it unfortunately does not come without dangers. As summer approaches, CHPD officers will begin to engage our community's bicyclists in order to pass along recognized safety tips and to inform them of Village regulations concerning the ever-popular activity.

With this being said, one of the easiest and effective ways to stay safe while bicycling, is to...

Wear a Helmet!

Recently, Village Codified Ordinance #444.07- SAFE RIDING REGULATIONS for BICYCLES was amended to require bicycle operators under the age of 16-years to wear a helmet. (See amendment below)

444.07 - SAFE RIDING REGULATIONS FOR BICYCLES

(i) All persons under the age of sixteen (16) years old shall wear a helmet at all times they are operating a bicycle within the Village

Although the ordinance only requires helmets for those under 16-YOA, it is highly recommended that all riders (no matter the age) wear a protective helmet while riding.

The CHPD asks that you please take time to review the enclosed NHTSA, Fitting Your Bike Helmet. Please share and discuss this important info with all young persons under your care.

Grilling Safety

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- ❗ Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- ❗ The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- ❗ Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- ❗ Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- ❗ Never leave your grill unattended.
- ❗ Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- ❗ There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- ❗ If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- ❗ Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- ❗ There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- ❗ When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

FACTS

- ❗ July is the peak month for grill fires.
- ❗ Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

Notary Service

Several of our employees at the village hall are Notaries for the State of Ohio, Cuyahoga County and would be happy to notarize items for village residents, free of charge during regular business hours.



Seven Hills Recreation Center

The village has continued their agreement with the Seven Hills Recreation Center for our residents to use their facility. Our village will pay 100% of the rate for bona-fide village residents that are 62-years of age and older, U.S. Veterans, and disabled residents. We will also pay 50% of the rate for all other bona-fide village residents desiring to secure a membership as outlined in our price sheet. In order to purchase a membership, please contact the village hall during normal business hours. Each resident/family must show proof that he/she is a bona-fide resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights. At that time, you will also need to pay your 50% of the membership (**cash or check only**) for those not covered under the 100% rate. A copy of the approved application, along with rules and regulations will then be given to the resident. It is then up to the resident to take the approved application to the Seven Hills Recreation Center so that you can receive your official pass. We hope our residents will take advantage of this special offer, as well as keeping fit.

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

The Village Service Department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. Our Service Department will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the Village Hall to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the Service Department at 216-641-3505 by 4:00 on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

Charity Pick Up

Our Service Department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the Service Department at 216-641-3505 prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our Village has a recycling container which is located in Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the Service Department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.



Dumpsters

Residents may rent a Village Dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the Service Director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

PEST AND INSECT CONTROL

Pest control services are available by contacting our Service Department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.



Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering)

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our Service Department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week payment must be made by the Thursday prior.

Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the Service Department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.

Tree Trimming/Removal Service

The Village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property. Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal. If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service. In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for this service, whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the Village has a contract with or another tree company. Forms can be found on the Village website and once completed can be returned to SD@cuyahogaheights.com or dropped off at the Village Hall.

Grass Cutting

The Village will cut the grass of each senior citizen's residence that is 60 years of age or older and that qualifies under the program. We must have a signed waiver on file to perform this service. Your form can be returned to the village hall. If you are unsure if you have a waiver on file, please contact the Service Department at 216-641-3505. Please remember remove dog droppings on routine basis.

Rototilling

The Cuyahoga Heights Service Department will rototill residential gardens once a year, free of charge, upon request. Area to be rototilled must be clearly marked. Please call the Service Department at 216-641-3505 to be put on the list.

Sports and Recreation Department

Swimming Pool

The swimming pool will officially open for the season on Saturday, June 4 at 12:00 p.m.; hours of operation are Monday through Sunday with open swim from 12:00-7:00 p.m. The cost for passes for village residents will be \$25 for an individual pass or \$75 for a family pass. More information will be sent out in the coming weeks regarding when village residents can purchase pool passes and the availability of swim lessons.

Concession Stand/Food Trucks

The concession stand in Bacci Park is currently open during the home games for the Cuyahoga Heights High School baseball and softball teams. It will be open daily for the season after Memorial Day. In June our very successful Food Trucks will be returning on Wednesday nights. Flyers with more information will be sent out in the coming weeks and our social media accounts will also be posting updates.
