After discussing the matter with council, it was decided to have our annual Easter egg hunt. The event is open to Cuyahoga Heights resident children and grandchildren from 0-12 years of age. It will take place at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday, April 1 at Klima Gardens. Please make sure the children bring their Easter basket/bag with them so they have something to put their eggs in during the egg hunt. We will also have a special guest appearance by the Easter Bunny who will be more than happy to take pictures with all. We hope that many of our residents will be able to attend.

Around Town

This past December we sent out a notice to our residents informing them that the Bacci Park playground would be undergoing renovations. For those that didn't know, the project has been completed and the playground is incredible! Many of the older children in town have already been using the playground during those beautiful days in February. Once again, I want to thank our elected officials for their support of this project, as well as to Cuyahoga County for the development supplemental grant which helped with a portion of the cost on this project. Bacci Park is truly an amazing park that has so much to offer, and I know many of us our looking forward to the opening of the concession stand, as well as the food trucks this summer.

Events

Last chance—memorial tree deadline is Monday, March 27. We will be celebrating Arbor Day on Friday, April 28 at 5:30 p.m. at Bacci Park. In doing so, residents may honor departed family members through the planting of a memorial tree. Residents may purchase a tree through the village for \$200 (cash or check) which includes your choice of a tree (Pin Oak, Red Oak, Norway Maple, Green Mountain, Sugar Maple, or Red Maple), its planting and initial maintenance, and a memorial plaque. The application along with payment must be turned into the village hall no later than March 27. Applications are available at the village hall, or you can download the form which is located on the home page of our website.







A bus trip is scheduled to the West Side Market on Saturday, March 4. The bus will pick up residents at their home beginning at 7:00 a.m. Shoppers will have a couple of hours to enjoy all the market has to offer. The bus will depart the market at 9:45 a.m. to bring you back to your residence. Residents must register by calling the village hall no later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, the day before the trip. Please also note that children 15 years of age and younger must be accompanied by an adult.

Mark your calendar for Saturday, June 3 from 8:00 a.m.—3:00 p.m. All village residents that are interested in participating in the garage sale at their homes need to register by calling the village hall at (216) 641-7020 during normal business hours. By registering your residence for this event, you will receive one (1) table which will be dropped off at your home earlier that week by our service department. Please be advised that there are not enough tables for more than one table per residence. In addition, we will be placing ads in the Neighborhood News and online in an effort to promote our garage sale. The deadline to register is Wednesday, May 17.

POLICE BLOTTER

1/02/2023: **Pursuit** – CHPD officers pursued a speeding pick-up truck that was observed entering the northbound lanes in the opposite direction. The vehicle eventually crashed in the area of Fleet Ave. The driver fled the scene on foot and a passenger was taken into custody. The driver was later identified and an arrest warrant was issued.

1/06/2023: **Pursuit** – CHPD officers assisted Valley View PD with the apprehension of a vehicle that had fled officers from Canal Rd. The vehicle fled north on E.71st at a high rate of speed. A CHPD officer deployed spike strips and deflated the suspect vehicle's tires. The vehicle then crashed and overturned at Grant Ave. Three suspects (2 males and 1 female) were apprehended by CHPD officers as they attempted to flee on foot. Two stolen firearms and drugs were recovered. Charges filed.

1/14/2023: **Drugs Seized at MVA** – Officers responded to I-77 South at the Brecksville Road exit ramp with a vehicle facing the wrong way in a snow embankment. The intoxicated driver was transported to Metro Hospital. A search of the vehicle revealed felony drugs and paraphernalia. Charges filed.

1/24/2023: **Stolen Vehicle Pursuit** – Officers assisted Independence Police with a pursuit of a stolen Kia on I-77 North. Spike strips were deployed by CHPD near Grant Avenue but the subject avoided the strips. The pursuit was terminated due to excessive speeds.

2/3/2023: **Utility Wires Down** – A semi-tractor trailer took down numerous wires and cable lines on Grant Avenue. The road was closed while utility crews, CHPD and CHFD assisted with clean-up.

2/3/2023: **Disturbance /Menacing** – Verbal altercation at a company on E. 49th Street that led to the termination of a male employee. The employee was removed from the property and advised not to return. Charges pending.

2/4/2023: **Resisting Arrest** – CHPD officers assisted Newburgh Heights Police with an intoxicated male fighting with officers and resisting arrest. The subject was arrested and taken into custody.



A Message from Your Police Department

Get in the Know before Betting your Dough



A recent January study conducted by cybersecurity company GeoComply has Ohio ahead of New York when it comes to total volume of sports betting across the state.



However, where there are rewards comes plenty of risks as well. One of the main concerns many people wonder is the simple question - Is gambling on sports safe?

Sportsbooks like Draft Kings, FanDuel and BetMGM are just a few of the more recognizable sports betting apps in the country.

These three are both safe and secure but will ask new users to provide key personal information when signing up. This includes home addresses, phone numbers, credit cards and even bank account numbers.

Some advice for any sports fan looking to make wagers and gamble on their favorite sports teams is to use these well-known and bigger sportsbooks when placing bets. The internet is full of many sites you can gamble on a big game, but using reputable companies to do it is the safest and most secure way to practice safe betting to limit cybersecurity risks.

There's no question gambling on a sporting event can make the overall game more exciting in so many ways. The truth is though it can also come at a price of severe financial loss or become an addiction as well. The Problem Gambling Network of Ohio reported that the Buckeye State more than doubled the amount of phone calls to the Ohio Problem Gambling Helpline since the start of January.

Gambling Helpline Network at 1-800-522-4700.

So how can you stay in the know and bet safe and securely?

Here are a few tips for all new sports bettors:

- · Start with small bets.
- Don't deposit more money than you're willing to lose.
- Don't chase losses.
- Have a clear and sober mindset when betting.

Lastly, for those with children, make sure access to cell phones and credit cards are not easily accessible. Secure the ease of access into your phone with a pin or fingerprint lock and setup a separate password when logging into any sportsbook app.

The village will be participating in a statewide tornado drill on March 22 at 9:50 am. We will be sounding our warning sirens throughout the village. Below are some safety tips to follow shall we ever have a tornado in our area.



Tornado Safety Tips

Whether practicing in a tornado drill or sheltering during a warning, the Ohio Committee for Severe Weather Awareness encourages Ohioans to DUCK!

D - Go DOWN to the lowest level

U - Get UNDER something

C - COVER your head

K - KEEP in shelter until the storm has passed

Safety basics

A tornado's path of destruction can be <u>more than one mile wide and 50 miles long</u> and can <u>devastate a neighborhood in seconds</u>. You may have little warning, so preparation and planning are key to reducing injuries. It's important to know what to do before, during, and after a tornado:

BEFORE

Know a safe place: Know the safe places at home, work and at school. Locate local shelters and be aware of the tornado risk in your county or parish.

- · Practice tornado drills at home and school.
- Have a plan for how family members will contact one another during an emergency. Establish
 an out-of-area contact (such as a relative or family friend) who can coordinate family
 members' locations and information should you become separated. Make sure children learn the
 phone numbers and addresses and know the emergency plans.
- Prepare a family disaster supplies kit. Families with children should have each child create their own personal pack.

DURING

During a tornado watch:


- Remain inside, away from windows and doors.
- Listen to the radio or TV. Keep a battery-operated radio or a NOAA Weather Radio.
- Make sure your family disaster supplies kit is complete.
- · Be alert during a thunderstorm watch. Severe thunderstorms can produce tornadoes.
- Being prepared will give you more time should the weather turn severe.

<u>During a tornado warning</u> - Listen to the radio or TV for weather updates and instructions from local officials. Quick action and planning ahead can save your life! If you get caught in a tornado, know what to do: take shelter immediately; stay away from windows, corners, doors and outside walls; be aware of flying debris. Crouch on the floor near an interior wall or under a heavy object, such as a table. Bend over and place your arms on the back of your head and neck (which are injured more easily than other parts of your body).

AFTER

Continue to listen to the news and weather updates. Stay away from power lines and broken glass.

Be aware of the possibility of broken gas lines and chemical spills. If you smell gas or chemical fumes, immediately evacuate the area and contact authorities. Stay out of damaged buildings and return home only after authorities have issued an all-clear signal.

What a mild winter we have had, 25 more days till spring! With spring and baseball right around the corner, we hope everyone has been healthy through the winter months so far.

On March 1st, the building department will be sending out Rental Renewal, Out of County owners of rental property and Vacant Dwelling applications. All applications are fillable online and can be found on our website @ www.cuyahogaheights.com under "building department".

Applications for the above are all due on April 1, 2023.

If you have rental property or a vacant dwelling and have questions regarding the applications, please contact the building department at 216-641-7020, during normal business hours of Monday – Friday 8:00 am through 4:30 pm.

The building department is finalizing new George M. Suhy grant forms for the approved new five year period (January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2027). All forms for the grant program will be issued from the building department per request. When applying for the George M. Suhy grant program, all paperwork must be submitted correctly before the start of your home improvement project. The guidelines for the program has changed, we will be sending out a mailer with a copy of new forms and new guidelines within the next week.

DID YOU KNOW:

Minimum height. Habitable space, hallways and portions of basements containing these spaces shall have a ceiling height of not less than 7 feet. Bathrooms, toilet rooms and laundry rooms shall have a ceiling height of not less than 6 feet 8 inches.



From your Service Department

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.



Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the service department to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the service department at 216-641-3505 by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.



Charity Pick Up

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the service department at 216-641-3505 prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container located at Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.



From your Service Department (continued)

Dumpsters

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the service director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.

Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering into your home.



Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering)

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (you must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. Job Requirements for all positions:

- All Park Monitors must be 16 years old by March 1, 2023.
- Concession Stand Cashiers, Pool Attendants, Lifeguards and Playground Monitors must be 15 years old by June 1, 2023.
- All Concession Stand Cashiers must possess proficient math skills, have an outgoing personality, and must be available to work nights and weekends.
- Applications <u>must</u> be turned in by 4:00 p.m. on <u>March 20, 2023</u> for Concession Stand and Park Monitors and by 4:00 p.m. on April 3, 2023 for the Pool.

Applications will not be accepted after these dates.

Lifeguards must be a Certified Lifeguard, CPR Certified and WSI (Water Safety Instructor - if applicable).

Applications and job descriptions are available at the village hall and online at www.cuyahogaheights.com under "Employment" or by email request to hr@cuyahogaheights.com.

(All returning employees you may contact your manager for applications as well) Park Monitors and Concession Stand Cashiers will start as soon as the weather permits! The Swimming Pool tentatively opens on Saturday, June 3, 2023.





Residential Snow Removal Program

- All village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the service director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our senior citizens will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues, the village will help residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the service department to plow their driveway. The village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the village for \$1 each, please stop at the service department.

Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Dave Sammons at 216-641-3505.

Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our service department.

If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one. If you are unsure if you have one on file, please contact Vera Heinzman at 216-641-3505 or sd@cuyahogaheights.com.









FirstEnergy Ohio Utilities Encourage Customer to Arrange Payment Plans and Apply for Bill Assistance Programs

Programs can help alleviate growing balances for customers having financial difficulty

AKRON, Ohio, Jan. 13, 2023 -- Residential customers of Ohio Edison, The Illuminating Company and Toledo Edison, subsidiaries of FirstEnergy Corp. (NYSE: FE), who are having difficulty making ends meet are encouraged to contact their utility now to enroll in payment plans or to receive referrals for bill assistance programs.

"Many of our customers continue to face financial challenges due to ongoing economic uncertainty," said Patricia Mullin, acting president of Ohio Operations for FirstEnergy. "With winter in full swing, I encourage customers who have fallen behind on their bills to contact us as soon as possible so that a member of our team can review their options with them."

Some of the programs customers may be eligible to participate in include:

- The Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP): Allows customers to pay a set percentage of their income
 toward their electric bill, regardless of the balance. Customers who maintain their payment plans may be
 eligible for debt forgiveness. Eligible customers should have income at or below 175% of federal poverty

- Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP): Provides eligible customers with cash grants for home heating bills and emergencies. Customers must have gross income at or below 175% of federal poverty guidelines. Call the Ohio Department of Development at 1-800-282-0880 or visit www.energyhelp.ohio.gov for more information.
- 2-1-1 Helpline: This nationwide resource and information helpline identifies locally available programs that
 may assist customers with utility bills or other needs. For more information, dial 211, text your ZIP code to
 898211 or visit the 211 website.
- Save the Dream Ohio Utility Assistance Plus (UAP): This program provides Ohio homeowners facing
 economic hardship caused by the COVID-19 pandemic with assistance paying mortgages, utility bills, nonescrowed property taxes and other qualified housing costs. A household may receive up to \$10,000 in
 utility and/or housing cost assistance. This part of the Save the Dream Ohio program is administered by
 participating local nonprofit agencies including the Community Action Agency and the Area Agency on

- Emergency Hardship Funds: These funds may be available to residential customers who have suffered a

Additionally, the \$175 Winter Reconnect Option allows residential customers who are disconnected or at risk of disconnection the opportunity to pay \$175 to have their service restored or maintained. There is no income eligibility requirement. PIPP customers who use this option may be eligible to have a reset of their past due amount.
