Village Financial Updates

The largest portion of the Village's Revenue comes from our tax revenue and is from income tax (i.e. payroll taxes/net profit). We are diligently monitoring that our budget and revenue is on track to reach our annual revenue estimates.

A Message from Your Police Department



With the end of the school year quickly approaching the CHS seniors will soon be graduating. This will bring to the community many graduation parties and celebrations.

Underage drinking increases during celebratory times such as prom and graduation.



Some Facts

- Parents who give alcohol to their teen's friends under any circumstances, even in their own homes, are breaking the law.
- Parents who knowingly allow a person under 21 to remain in their home or on their property while consuming or
 possessing alcoholic beverages can be prosecuted.
- Adults (non-parents/non-guardians) can be prosecuted for serving or purchasing alcohol for minors, which carries a
 penalty of up to a \$1,000 fine and up to 6-months in jail.

Suggestions When Hosting

- · Send invitations and try to avoid the "open party" situation.
- Don't send e-mail invitations. They can be forwarded to a large number of people quickly and you lose control of
 who has the information.
- · Put your phone number on the invitation and welcome calls from parents.
- Set rules ahead of time such as no alcohol, tobacco or other drugs.
- · Set a start and end time for the party.
- · Avoid allowing underage attendees to leave and return to the party.
- · Provide plenty of food and non-alcoholic beverages.
- Let your neighbors know in advance there will be a party and that you will be there to supervise.
- · Familiarize yourself with your community's noise ordinance.
- · Limit the party access to a certain area of the house/property.
- · Have a plan for dealing with vehicles. Include parking information on your party invitation.
- · Secure all forms of alcohol.
- Make regular and visits to all party areas while being sensitive to your graduates need for independence.
- Invite other parents to help chaperone if there is a large number of teenagers expected.


If You're Away or Out of Town

- Set and communicate rules and standards to be followed in your absence.
- · Do not allow underage youth to have unsupervised parties or gatherings.
- · Remind them of their responsibilities and the consequences of their actions.
- Have a relative or responsible adult stay at your home during your absence, have your teenager stay with a
 responsible adult or ask a neighbor to watch the house and stop in while you are gone.

A Message from Your Police Department cont...

If Your Teen Attends A Party Elsewhere:

- · Discuss the graduation events and parties with your teen and with other parents.
- Be sure to know the exact location or address of the party and the phone number of those hosting the party.
- · Ensure that an adult will be home and that there will be no alcohol or other drugs allowed.
- · Know who your child is attending the party with and obtain all necessary cell phone numbers.
- · Establish clear guidelines and curfews.
- · Talk to your teen about the serious dangers and consequences of underage drinking and driving.
- Plan for transportation beforehand. Assure your teen that you, a relative or an adult friend can be called at any time
 if a ride is needed... NO QUESTIONS ASKED!
- · Be awake when your teen gets home. This will give you the opportunity to talk with them and be involved.
- · Remind your child that you are there for them always with...NO QUESTIONS ASKED!

Philips Lifeline





The Cuyahoga Heights Fire Department is dedicated to finding solutions that support the independence of older adults. One of these solutions is the Phillips Lifeline System—ideal for a variety of needs. Have you fallen and require assistance? Are you having trouble breathing and need an ambulance? Find yourself locked out of the house and must find someone with a key? Philips Lifeline can help connect your loved ones and the fire department. Signing up is easy. We will come to your home and show you how the system can work, install the equipment, maintain all your products, and assist you with any questions along the way.

- 33% of people age 65+ will fall. At 80, that increases to 50%.
- Seniors who receive help within an hour have a better rate of survival.
- The faster help arrives, the less likely an injury will lead to hospitalization or the need to move into a long-term care facility.

From your Service Department

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.

Special Pick Up

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, don't forget to call the service department to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must call the service department at 216-641-3505 by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up.

Charity Pick Up

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service, and you must call the service department at 216-641-3505 prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service.

Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container located at Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.

Dumpsters

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the service director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.







From your Service Department (continued)

Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.

Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering into your home.

Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering)

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (you must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. Tree Trimming/Removal Service

The village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property. Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal. If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service. In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for this service, whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the village has a contract with or another tree company. Forms can be found on the village website and once completed can be returned to SD@cuyahogaheights.com or dropped off at the village hall.

Grass Cutting

The village will cut the grass of each senior citizen's residence that is 60 years of age or older and that qualifies under the program. We must have a signed waiver on file to perform this service. Your form can be returned to the village hall. If you are unsure if you have a waiver on file, please contact the service department at 216-641-3505. Please remember to remove dog droppings on a routine basis.

Rototilling

The Cuyahoga Heights Service Department will rototill residential gardens once a year, free of charge, upon request. Area to be rototilled must be clearly marked. Please call the service department at 216-641-3505 to be put on the list.

Cedar Point Season Pass Reimbursement

The Village of Cuyahoga Heights will reimburse \$50 to any resident who purchases or has already purchased a Cedar Point Season Pass for the 2023 season. Residents must show a valid 2023 season pass or receipt of payment (with pass holder name listed) and proof of residency for reimbursement. Reimbursement will NOT be given for anyone not currently residing in Cuyahoga Heights. Please bring your valid 2023 season pass or receipt of payment (must show passholder name) and proof of residency to Village Hall for verification. Reimbursement will be issued within two weeks of submission acceptance. Reimbursement is \$50 regardless of pass type purchased.
