From Mayor Bacci's Desk

Happy sunshine and hello summer! We had an amazing turnout on the first day the pool opened with over 120 patrons—it also helped that it was very hot and humid! After four days into the pool season, we had sold over 530 pool passes which was great to see! In case you didn't know, pool hours are Monday through Sunday from 12:00-7:00 p.m. New this year and making the pool pass process more streamlined, patrons were able to purchase their passes online. Our staff has been putting a lot of effort and work into having all our forms online for our residents and businesses—from building department forms to dumpster rentals, special pick-ups, meals on wheels—just to name a few.



Mind Challenge

As I mentioned in last month's newsletter, a group of our senior citizens formed a team and had been participating with other senior communities playing "Mind Challenge." Our team won their round on Tuesday, June 6, but unfortunately lost the next round on Tuesday, June 13 and didn't place in the Finals. Special Election

The Cuyahoga County Board of Elections is holding a Special Election on Tuesday, August 8. Issue 1 — Proposed Amendment to the Ohio Constitution. The polls will be open from 6:30 a.m. until 7:30 p.m. at the village hall in the civic room (lower level.) Please note that if you have moved or changed your name since you last voted, you must complete a new registration form to reflect your new address and/or new name. Voter registration forms, as well as vote by mail applications are available for our residents at the village hall, and on our web site on the home page. Please exercise your right to vote!

Flu Shots

In cooperation with Independence Discount Drug Mart, Nurse Socausky, and my office—we will again be offering flu shots to our village senior residents (60 years of age and older) on Friday, September 15 at Klima Gardens. So that we can safely manage the event, blood work appointments will begin at 8:30 a.m. in 10-minute increments; flu shots will begin at 9:00 a.m. in 3-minute increments. As a reminder, if you plan on getting blood work, please do not eat or drink anything, except water, after midnight the night before. Please contact Lee Ann at the village hall during normal business hours. Deadline to register is Thursday, August 31. Flu shots and blood work will strictly be by appointment only.

Drug Mart will provide us with registration forms which we will drop off at your home prior to your appointment. You will need to fill it out and bring it with you on the day of your appointment. We will again be serving a warm breakfast for our senior citizens (packaged in individual containers)—so you can either eat it at Klima’s or take it home with you. If you are 65 years of age or older, please bring your Medicare Card as we will seek Medicare payment for qualifying seniors. Our village will pay for flu shots for our village senior residents and employees just like we’ve done in the past.

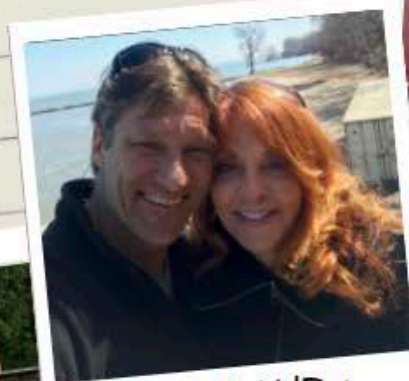

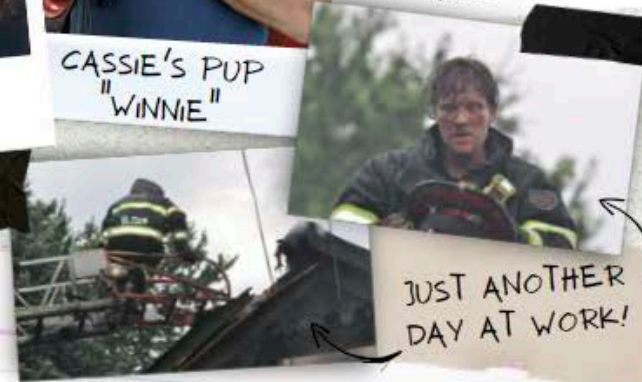

A Message from Your Police Department



As we move into the summer season, The Cuyahoga Heights Police Department would like to remind you of the following:

Bacci Park Rules

Leash Law: Remember that your dogs need to always be on a leash/tethered and under control at all times. Please be courteous and pick up your pets' waste. (Ref. CHV Ordinance-#618.01).

Fishing: Permits are required for fishing at Bacci Park. Residents may obtain permits at the police station. (8a-4p M-F). The cost for the fishing permit is \$10.00 and the pond is catch and release only.

Pavilions: Residents may reserve pavilions by obtaining a permit through the village hall. If not reserved, pavilions may be used by residents on a "first-come-first-serve" basis.

Ball Fields: Are for use by permit only. None one is allowed on any ball field at any time unless reserved by a permit. Please contact the village hall for permit requirements.



Alcohol: No alcohol is allowed in Bacci Park except for special events with proper permits.

Motorized Scooters and Boards: Motorized scooters capable of traveling 15 mph or more are prohibited on all village streets, sidewalks, trails and lots. All motorized skateboards and "one-wheels" are also prohibited. (Ref. CHV Ordinance-#451.01)

Village Curfew

Now that school is out for the summer more children will be out during evening hours. Curfew hours will be enforced in an effort to keep our children safe.

Parents, please reference the following schedule:

- Under 12 yoa.....9:00 pm to 6:00 am of the following day
- 13 and 14 yoa....10:00 pm to 6:00 am of the following day
- 15 and 16 yoa....11:00 pm to 6:00 am of the following day
- 17 yoa.....12:00 am to 6:00 am of the following day

Please remember if children are in your yard and it is past their curfew time, an adult must be present outside with them.

(Ref. CHV Ordinance #648.10)

FIREWORKS

Although fireworks are now legal on certain dates, there are still laws governing and rules governing their use. Some of these are as follows:

- The new law prohibits anyone from using or possessing fireworks while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, alcohol, or controlled substances. **This violation is a 1st degree misdemeanor which carries a penalty of up to 180 days in jail and a \$1000 fine.**
- Fireworks **must** be set off on your own property or another's private property (with owner's permission). It is illegal to ignite fireworks on another person's property without permission.
- Within the Village of Cuyahoga Hts., fireworks are **not** permitted in/on any village or publicly accessible property, including (but not limited to); streets, roadways, parking lots, sidewalks, driveway aprons, tree lawns, parks or trails.

Cuyahoga Heights Police officers will respond to any and all firework complaints. Upon investigation of the complaint, officers will consider the "totality of the circumstances" and use their discretion to determine the appropriate enforcement response if/as needed.

Factors officers may take into consideration are (but not limited to):

- overall public safety (any device(s) or display deemed un-safe will be shut down)
- location, distance & display proximity factors (i.e., adequate safety zone radius)
- size/power of devices (1.3G Class, black market or homemade devices are prohibited)
- time duration of display(s)
- time of day/night (fireworks after mid-night (00:00hrs.) may be considered a peace disturbance)

Always consider safety and courtesy your priority, while enjoying your firework display.

With a little "common sense" and courtesy from all, everyone should be able to enjoy this summer's holiday season!

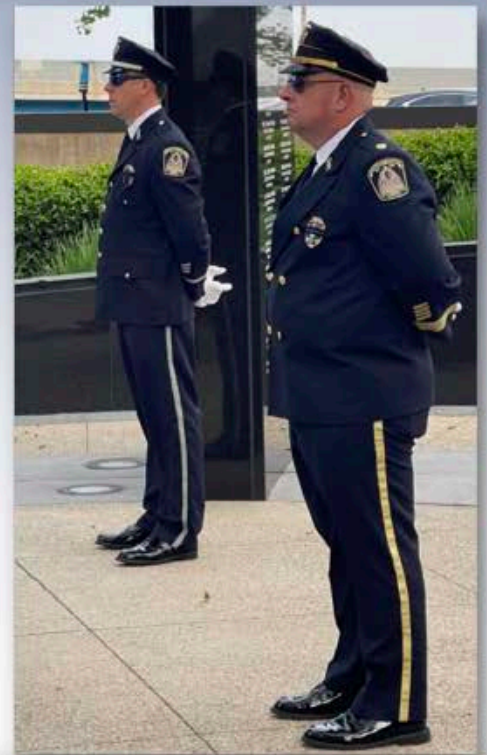

During this detail, the names of each and every officer killed in the line of duty are read continuously.

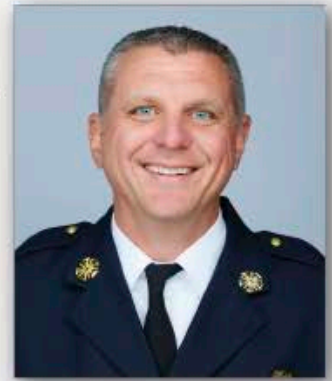
The honor guard detail is then followed by a large parade and a closing memorial service at which dignitaries and surviving family members are invited to speak.

The Village of Cuyahoga Heights and the Fire Department have partnered with the Allison Rose Foundation to bring training and stock epinephrine to the concession stand at Bacci Park, the village hall, William R. Gerdon Pool and Klima Gardens. Staff members at these locations have each been trained on how to recognize an allergic reaction and administer epinephrine.

IF ANAPHYLAXIS, USE AN EPINEPHRINE AUTO-INJECTOR

STEP 1

Remove device from case.



STEP 2

Remove safety cap(s).

STEP 3

Apply device to outer thigh, then apply firm pressure.

STEP 4

Hold device in place for 2-10 seconds (depends on device).

STEP 5

Call 911. Repeat steps 1-4 if no improvement in 5 minutes.

KEY POINTS

- Person having reaction should lay down. Ideally, legs should be elevated.
- Epinephrine auto-injectors can be given through clothing.
- 911 should ALWAYS be called when anaphylaxis (a severe allergic reaction) is suspected.

Over 32 million Americans live with food allergies. Recognizing a severe allergic reaction is the first step to an effective response. While ambulances regularly carry epinephrine, the only medication that stops an allergic reaction is epinephrine, ideally administered from an auto injector. The ability to have an audible device (Auvi-Q Epinephrine Auto-Injector) to instruct the public about the application process can be lifesaving. During a severe allergic reaction, known as anaphylaxis, delaying treatment can be a risk factor for a worsening reaction or even death.



The Allison Rose Foundation (ARF) was formed by Fire Chief Michael Suhy and his family after he lost his daughter, Allison Rose Suhy, to an anaphylactic allergic reaction.

To-date, ARF has trained more than 65 K-12 schools and universities and 20 non-school entities and already this year have trained more than 12,000 individuals.

From your Service Department

Garbage Pick Up – Recycling – Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.



Special Pick Up – Now Online!

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, you can now go online to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must submit your information by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select '**Online Services**' & select the red '**Special Pick Up**' tab. Please fill out your name, address, and all information regarding items you would like to be picked up and where they are located. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.

Charity Pick Up – Now Online!

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select '**Online Services**' & select the red '**Charity Pick Up**' tab. Please fill out your name, address, and all information regarding items you would like to donate and where items are located. This must be submitted prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.



Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container located at Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.



From your Service Department (continued)

Dumpsters - Online Coming Soon!

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items **NOT** including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Contact the service director at 216-641-3505 for this service. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.



Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.



Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.

Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering) - Online Coming Soon!

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (you must sign-up up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. Tree Trimming/Removal Service

The village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property. Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal. If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service. In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for this service, whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the village has a contract with or another tree company. Forms can be found on the village website and once completed can be returned to sd@cuyahogaheights.com or dropped off at the village hall.

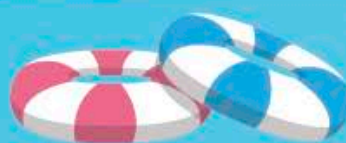

New Rules for Voting in 2023

Voting on Election Day at the Polls: The following are acceptable forms of identification (ID) for voting a regular ballot at the polls on Election Day:

- An Ohio driver's license
- An Ohio state ID card
- An interim ID form issued by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles
- A U.S. passport or passport card
- A U.S. military ID card, Ohio National Guard ID card, or U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs ID card
(that includes the voter's name and photograph).

Notes: An Ohio driver license or state ID card must be *unexpired*. An Ohio driver license or state ID card with a voter's previous address is acceptable, if the previous address matches the voter's record in the pollbook. A state ID card is the primary form of photo ID for a person who does not hold any type of driver license or whose driver license is suspended.

Free State ID Cards: Any person 17 and over who applies for and receives a state ID card from the BMV will receive it for free.

Voting Early In-Person at the Board of Elections: The ID requirements are the same as when **Voting on Election Day at the Polls**.

Note: The day before Election Day (Monday) has been eliminated as an Early In-Person voting day.

Vote-by-Mail: One of the following are acceptable forms of ID to apply for and return an absentee ballot by mail (VBM):

- An Ohio driver's license *number*
- An Ohio state ID card *number*
- The last four digits of the elector's social security number (SSN)
- A *copy* of a photo ID. For a driver license and state ID, this means a copy of *both* the front and back. For a U.S. passport, a copy means a copy of the ID page of the passport that includes the elector's name, photo, and other identifying information, including the expiration date.

Notes: **NEW DEADLINE!** Vote-by-Mail Ballot Applications **must be received by the Board of Elections the Tuesday before the election**. Ballots must be postmarked on or before the day before an election. **NEW DEADLINE!** Ballots mailed to the Board of Elections must arrive at the Board of Elections within four days after the election. The previous deadline was ten days after the election.

Voter Registration: A person who registers or updates their registration online must continue to provide both an Ohio driver license/state ID number and the last four of their SSN. Paper voter registration cards require an Ohio driver license number or the last four digits of an SSN. **NEW:** An Ohio state ID card number is now acceptable.

Young Poll Workers: Any person who is at least 17 years of age may now be a poll worker. In the past only 17-year-old high school seniors were allowed to be poll workers.
