Please note that there was an error in our 2024 village calendar. On Friday, April 26, 2024, there will **not** be an Arbor Day celebration at Bacci Park. Voting polls will be open for the 2024 Primary Election on Tuesday, March 19, 2024, at the village hall from 6:30 a.m. until 7:30 p.m.If you have moved or changed your name since you last voted, you must complete a new registration form to reflect your new address and/or new name. Voter registration forms must be postmarked 30 days before an election in order to be eligible to vote. The scholarship program assists village resident graduates. Recipients will be awarded a \$1,000 scholarship in the form of a tuition reimbursement.

In order to be eligible for the award, the recipients must meet several requirements:

- 1. Be a resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights.
- 2. Be a graduating high school senior in the spring or summer of 2024.
- 3. Be enrolled either full-time or part-time, at an accredited college, university, community college, vocational or technical school for the fall of 2024.
- 4. Complete the fall 2024 school term with a grade point average sufficient to be in good standing with the academic institution.
- 5. Must submit proof of grades to the CFO's office by March 1, 2025.

Applications are available at the Cuyahoga Heights High School Guidance Office or at the village hall and must be submitted to the CFO at the village hall or via email, by May 1, 2024.

A Message from Your Police Department



PEDESTRIAN SAFETY FOR THE WINTER

Pedestrians need to be more aware than ever these days. Distracted drivers are everywhere, leading to more and more car accidents and auto-pedestrian accidents. This is why walking defensively becomes even more important during the icy, snowy winter months.



Remember the Following Safety Tips:

Wear the Right Footwear

Your footwear makes a big difference in your ability to avoid a slip and fall. Wear boots with good rubber tread, manufactured specifically for winter walking. Carry your other shoes with you, even if you are just going to walk a few steps from the curb to your place of work. Those few steps can be a disaster if you have slippery, smooth footwear.

Watch for Vehicles

You may feel safe when walking on the sidewalk or waiting on a corner to cross a street, but during the winter months, this is not necessarily true. Vehicles lose control more easily on slick roads, sliding into intersections, across crosswalks and onto sidewalks. Stay very aware of the movements of traffic and when crossing the street, observe the traffic before you take the risk of stepping out. Don't step out in front of oncoming cars, assuming they will stop.

Wear Gloves Rather Than Using Pockets

If your hands are in your pockets, you can lose your ability to break a fall with your arms thus increasing the potential for a serious head or brain injury. Wear warm gloves and keep your hands free and use any handrails or other supports when available.

Snow Emergency Parking Ban Codified Ord. #452.13

Please remember that whenever the snow exceeds 2 inches, the snow ban will be placed into effect. We ask that you refrain from parking on the streets if the weather forecast predicts snow that will accumulate two (2) inches or more.

CHPD officers will attempt to notify residents if their vehicles need to be removed from the street. However, vehicles may be cited and as a last resort towed to allow the the Service Department to clear the streets. This way, you, the service department and safety forces can safely navigate the streets. Also, please advise all guests of this information.

A Message from Your Police Department



This year Super Bowl LVIII is Sunday, February 11.

The Super Bowl is one of America's biggest national sporting events where friends and families gather to socialize and watch the big game. Yet, it has also become one of the nation's most dangerous days on the roadways due to impaired driving.

Impaired-driving crashes and fatalities can be prevented. **Designating a sober driver** should be on the top of everyone's Super Bowl party list, but there are other ways you can help save lives, too.

If you are **attending** a Super Bowl Party:

- Designate your sober driver before the party begins and give that person your car keys.
- Avoid drinking too much alcohol too fast by pacing yourself eat enough food, take breaks, and alternate with nonalcoholic drinks.
- If you don't have a designated driver, ask a sober friend for a ride home; call an Uber/LYFT, friend, or family member to come and get you; or just stay where you are and sleep it off until you are sober.
- Never let a friend leave your sight if you think they are about to drive while impaired. Remember: Fans Don't Let Fans Drive Drunk.
- Always buckle up it's still your best defense against other impaired drivers.

If you are **hosting** a Super Bowl Party:

- Remember, you can be held liable and prosecuted if someone you served ends up in an impaired-driving crash.
- Be sure all of your guests designate their drivers in advance or help arrange ride sharing with sober drivers.
- Serve lots of food and be sure to include plenty of non-alcoholic beverages at the party.
- Stop serving alcohol at the end of the third quarter of the game and begin serving coffee and dessert.

 Keep the contacts/aps for local transportation companies handy and take the keys away from anyone who is thinking of driving while impaired.



Mobile Stroke Unit Response Time Mobile Stroke Treatment Unit Response Time 2018 – 2022

Cleveland Clinic's mobile stroke treatment unit (MSTU) — one of the first units of its kind in the US was launched to shorten the time between the onset of a patient's stroke-like symptoms and the delivery of life- and disability-sparing therapies for stroke. The unit is operated by specialized staff who use its advanced equipment to allow Cleveland Clinic stroke physicians to swiftly diagnose and treat stroke patients prior to arrival in an emergency department. The MSTU team's goal is the efficient evaluation, treatment, and transport of patients suffering from stroke and other neurological emergencies. Time to treatment is an important factor in stroke treatment, and the MSTU team continually works toward more efficient processes. Patients with severe stroke symptoms benefit more from care at comprehensive and thrombectomy-capable stroke centers. A critical part of the MSTU mission is to get the right patient to the right hospital the first time, avoiding the need for a second ambulance transport. Since it was launched in July 2014, Cleveland Clinic's MSTU has transported more than 1800 stroke patients, administered IV thrombolysis to more than 200 patients, transported more than 125 brain hemorrhage patients, and helped more than 120 patients undergo a thrombectomy procedure to remove a blood clot from the brain. In 2021, Cleveland Clinic's MSTU was able to administer IV thrombolysis 37 minutes faster on average than if a patient was transported to an emergency department using a traditional ambulance. Commitment to this level of service has resulted in care that consistently beats targets and improves patient outcomes.

BE FAST

In a stroke, every minute counts. Use the **BE FAST** method to evaluate whether someone may be having a stroke:





BALANCE: Watch for a sudden loss of balance.





EYES: Is there a sudden loss of vision in one or both eyes? Or double vision?





FACE: Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?





ARMS: Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?






SPEECH: Ask the person to repeat a simple phrase. Is their speech slurred or strange?





TIME: If you observe any of these signs, call 9-1-1 imediately.

TIPS FOR HIRING A CONTRACTOR

Everyone wants to get the best work done for their dollar. Unfortunately, not all the professionals will deliver a high quality of work or be honest about the total cost to complete a project. Here are some things to consider and red flags to watch for before you hire a contractor:

- <u>Make sure the contractor is registered</u>- with the Village of Cuyahoga Heights building department. This protects you and the village.
- <u>References</u>- any professional company will have references for you to check and confirm their ability to perform the work.
- <u>Get it in writing-</u> a written contract can save you a lot of headaches, a real professional will not have a problem with providing you one.
- <u>The contractor is on time</u>- if your contractor does not show up on time, especially for the first meeting, they are showing you they have no respect for your time and it will not change when you hire them.
- <u>Get 2-3 quotes</u>- be suspicious of too-low of a price offered. Ask yourself what corners they are cutting to get a price that is much lower than anybody else.
- <u>Deposit or money down</u>- if the deposit required is more than 50% of the job, this should raise a red flag, a reputable contractor will not take a large sum of money down.
- Permitting- make sure this is negotiated in your contract price and agreed on that the contractor will apply for the construction permit.
- <u>Appearance</u>- look how they present themselves, look at the shape of their vehicle, when they pull out of your driveway, did they deposit fluids on your driveway. They are there to respect your property.

If you notice any of these signs, it may be indicating how much of a true professional they are. If you have any questions, please contact the building department @ 216-641-7020.



DID YOU KNOW?

STAIRWAYS

Width - Stairways shall have a minimum 36-inch width above handrails.

Tread and Risers - Maximum riser height shall be 7 ¾ " inches and minimum tread shall be 10" inches. The maximum variation shall not exceed 3/8" inch

From your Service Department

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday, the service will commence on Tuesday.



Special Pick Up - NOW ONLINE!

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, you can now go online to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must submit your information by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' &

select the red 'Special Pick Up' tab. Please fill out your name, address, and all information regarding the items you would like to be picked up and where they are located. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.



Charity Pick Up - NOW ONLINE!

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service. Please visit

www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Charity Pick Up' tab. Please enter your address and select from the drop down. Fill out your name, phone number, email address and all information regarding items you would like to donate and where items are located. This must be submitted prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.



Dumpsters - NOW ONLINE!

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not

mix materials. Please visit <u>www.cuyahogaheights.com</u> at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Dumpster Rental' tab. Select your address from the drop down. Fill in your name, phone number & email address. Select a requested date for dumpster to be delivered & where you would like the dumpster to be placed. There is now the option to pay the fee online via a link sent to your email. You also can drop off cash or check payments to village hall. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

From your Service Department

Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.

Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering) - NOW ONLINE!

This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunch time meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (you must sign-up for a full week.) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. Tree Trimming/Removal Service - NOW ONLINE!

The village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property.

Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal

If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service.

In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for this service,

whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the village has a contract with or another tree company. Please visit online at www.cuyahogaheights.com under 'Online Services' & select the red 'Tree Trimming' tab.



Residential Snow Removal Program – NOW ONLINE!

- All village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the service director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our senior citizens will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues, the village will help residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the service department to plow their driveway. The village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the village for \$1 each, please stop at the service department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Dave Sammons at 216-641-3505.
- Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our service department. If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one. Reimbursement will be issued within three weeks of submission acceptance. Reimbursement is


Recycle right in your home by placing only these items in your recycling. Items should be loose - unbagged - in your recycling bin.

Paper and Boxes Empty and flatten boxes.


Plastic Bottles and Jugs & Tubs Empty and rinse.



It's important to recycle correctly. Some items don't belong in your recycling bin.



- Ranked in the top 5% of all districts in the State of Ohio (more than 600) in virtually every measurement used by the Ohio Department of Education.
- Maintained an outstanding music program, being recognized by the NAMM (National Association of Music Merchants) as an outstanding community for music for 19 consecutive years. No other district in Ohio has received this recognition for this length of time.
 - Maintained outstanding athletic programs, winning a State Championship in softball as well as a runner-up finish, two runner-up finishes in the state for football, a runner-up in baseball, and another trip to the final four and regional finals appearances in both boys and girls basketball, as well as multiple individual performance placements in other sports.

As the District plans for today and the future, the Board of Education, Superintendent, and Treasurer are working toward not only continuing but also improving the quality of education and support provided to our students and their families by

- Ensuring the high quality of the academic, arts and athletic programs while state funding sources decrease. The district has lost \$14 million dollars since 2012 as a result of reductions in the Tangible Personal Property taxes (TPP).
- Identifying and giving utmost importance to the upkeep of school buildings and property. A continuous and efficient facilities
 program is essential to uphold safety standards and ensure the maintenance of high-quality buildings, providing a secure and
 conducive environment for students and staff to learn and work.
- Continuing to enhance the desirability of Brooklyn Heights, Cuyahoga Heights and Valley View. While the District has the lowest Class One Effective Tax Rate in Cuyahoga County, it is ranked in the top five percent of ALL Ohio public schools (over 600 school Districts).
